## **IMPORTANT TIPS**

### When should I look for housing?

Most students look for housing many months in advance. Students start to secure housing for the next academic year as early as October. To be safe, you should have all your housing secured by March at the latest. The majority of leases are year-long and do not have contractual subleasing agreements. There are some select places that do offer six month leases. If you sign a 12-month lease, you are required to pay for those 12 months, as outlined in your lease. Leases are legally binding documents.

#### **General Prices**

Living in Athens can be pretty inexpensive, so it is not too hard to find an affordable rent. Most students pay between \$400-\$600 a month, but prices can range anywhere from \$300 per month to \$1,200 per month. These prices depend on how new the apartment/townhome/house is, where it is located, and what services or amenities are offered with it.

### Subleasing

You will need to check your landlord to determine if subletting is allowed within your lease agreements. If you choose to sublet your place to someone, it often means you will still be liable to any rent, utilities, etc. that your subleaser will pay you. ### Furnished vs. Unfurnished

Some places come furnished. Furnished means that it comes with a bed frame, mattress, desk, and chair. It also includes living room and kitchen furniture but will depend on each unit.

Memorial Hall	*	On campus, home of International Student Life
Downtown	Ŷ	Downtown places include any apartment complexes that lie outside of campus, in the downtown area of Athens. There are many places to live, but can often be more expensive due to location and amenities. Many of the places are new apartment complexes, which also lead to higher prices.
North Athens	9	North Athens includes apartment complexes and townhomes that are outside of the downtown area, past The Standard.
Chicopee-Dudley	<b>9</b>	This area lies to the east of downtown and campus. A more residential area that is often a short walk to campus and ranges in prices.
East Side	Ŷ	East Side includes all the apartment complexes and townhomes that lie more towards East Campus near Barnett Shoals Road. This is a little further out than some of the other options, but can be cheaper and is still a short drive to campus and has no buses.
Baxter Street	9	Baxter Street includes all the apartment complexes and townhomes that are on Baxter Street. This option is very close to campus, which is great for walking and the prices are usually reasonable.
Macon Highway Area	9	One of the furthest away options, but is a great area for townhomes and is just a short drive away. There may be bus options depending on the place of housing.

## **ROOMMATE TIPS**

### **Roommate or No Roommate?**

Choosing to live with roommates or not is a personal choice, but if you decide to, check out our tips on how to find them and some ways to get along with them! Roommates are a great way to save a little money and to possibly make some friends at the same time!

### Where to Find a Roommate?

If you are living on campus, you can find a roommate through DawgHouse, which is a matching program.

If you are living off campus, Facebook is your best tool. Groups like UGA/Athens Lease/Sublease are a great place to look for shorter leases, roommates, and if you need to sublease your apartment.

### Tips for Living with a Roommate:

- 1. Have a thermostat agreement (Some people like the house too cold or too hot and it can be expensive).
- 2. Choose roommates with a similar lifestyle (Pets or no pets, smoker or nonsmoker, undergraduate or graduate students, etc.).
- 3. Have a consistent rule for the common area (e.g. Everyone washes their own dishes or load the dishwasher; each person takes the trash away one week of the month, etc.)
- 4. Communication is key (Have conversations and agreements at the beginning of your living situation)

## **Before Signing a Lease**

If any of these things are not working or need improvement, be sure to discuss them with your landlord and get them fixed before you sign the lease.



#### Appliances

Check to make sure they work. (Oven, microwave, stove, refrigerator, washer/dryer, etc)



#### Faucets

Check to make sure all the faucets are working. You should check to see that both the cold and hot water work.



#### Safety and Privacy

Check to make sure there are smoke detectors on each floor, that all of your door locks are working properly and that there are blinds or space for curtains.



#### AC/Heating Unit

Check to make sure the air conditioning and heating works.



#### **Interior Surfaces**

Inspect walls, floors, and carpet for mold, cracks, and scratches.



#### Lighting

Make sure all the light fixtures work. Also be sure to check that there is enough indoor and outdoor lighting for your preference and safety.



#### Windows

Check to make sure all the windows are intact, can be opened and closed, and are able to be locked from the inside.



## **INSPECTING A PROPERTY**

## **Applications**

There is often an application before the lease that may have an additional fee. Landlord will check over your information and then inform you whether or not you qualify for a lease.

### **Commonalities in Leases**

Often sent through online lease/agreement forms. (examples: Docusign, Dotloop)

## Main Components of a Lease

- Rent (either total monthly payments or individual per roommate)
  - $\circ~$  Where/to whom it should be paid
- Time of lease
- Subletting restrictions
- Pet allowances
- Information on utilities
- Use of premises
- Repairs and damages to the property
- Security Deposits (Security deposits are common- you will get them back at the end of your lease if no damages to the property are incurred)
- Early Termination of the Lease
- Move out procedures
- Overall what you and the landlord respectively are responsible for



## Other Leasing Information

### **Security Deposit**

What is it?

• A security deposit is a required, but a refundable payment. It ensures that the property is not damaged, and all rent is paid during the time you lease it. The payment is often equivalent to one month's rent and will be returned to you at the end of your lease if there are no issues.

Tips on Security Deposits:

Take pictures of your entire place before you officially move in

• Take note of anything that is not in the proper condition and inform your landlord (there will often be a form, but if there is not, be sure to do this) Make sure to ask about your security deposit at the end of your lease

## **Repairs & Work Orders**

What happens if something needs to be repaired?

 Most apartment complexes and houses have work order systems. A work order is usually an online form where you can submit your problem, and your landlord or building representative will follow up with you • Don't hesitate to submit a work order; it is their job to fix any repairs!

### Main Components of a Lease

How is rent paid every month?

 It will depend on each complex, but there are often a couple different ways to pay rent:

The first way is to send a check to your building management or real estate company (If this information isn't in the lease, check with your landlord)

The second way is often through an online payment system, where you can set up automatic payments every month. It connects to your bank account, and lets you know when it's been paid so you don't have to worry!

• If you pay with a credit card, there is often a fee associated with it.

## **Transportation**

### **Buses**

There are two main bus systems here in Athens: Athens Transit and the UGA Bus system. Download the UGA app for bus information and routes. Both bus systems are free, but you need to have your student ID to ride for free on Athens Transit. Many off-campus apartments are either on the Athens Transit route or have their own bus transportation to campus. Browse the Athens Transit routes at this link. Download the MyStop mobile app to view up-todate Athens bus information.

### Walking/Biking

Many students decide to bike or walk to campus and around Athens. There are bike racks located around campus, however keep in mind that not all roads have separate bike lanes and Athens is very hilly. You can get to most places by walking, but you'll probably need a bus or car to get outside of campus. View this link to get a map of all bike parking available on campus.

### **Car: Parking Information**

Register for a parking spot at parking.uga.edu. Register as early as possible to ensure that you get a space if needed.

- Registration usually starts in April. An email will be sent out, but you can check the website ahead of time as well.
- Cost: Prices range from \$20-\$40 per month. You can register for an academic year pass or a full year (from August to July). Lots will range from \$20-\$30 per month, while the parking decks are \$40 per month.
